That the Man of God May be Complete

2 Timothy 3:16-17

Introduction

- 1. The Bible is one of God's most wonderful gifts to mankind.
- 2. We have salvation through Jesus Christ, but it is the gospel message found in the Bible that reveals that salvation to us.
 - a. Through the reading and preaching of the Scriptures the Holy Spirit is able to *"convict the world of sin, and of righteousness, and of judgment"* (John 16:8).
 - b. Without the Scriptures we would not be convicted.
- 3. In recent years the attack on the Scriptures as the sufficient and only guide for mankind has increased, even infiltrating churches that claim to be of Christ.
- 4. In this lesson we will consider Paul's words in <u>2 Tim. 3:16-17</u> in order to see that the Scriptures are not only from God, but are totally adequate to make the man of God *"complete, thoroughly equipped for every good work."*

Discussion

I. All Scripture Is Inspired of God

- A. <u>2 Pet. 1:19-21</u>: Prophets Spoke as They Were Moved By The Holy Spirit
 - 1. Not men spouting own opinions.
 - 2. God sent His Spirit, Spirit revealed God's word, prophets wrote it down. "Thus says the Lord" (Jer. 2:2).
- B. New Testament Scriptures
 - 1. Most acknowledge the authenticity of the O.T. Scriptures.
 - 2. When it comes to the N.T. Scriptures, some are reluctant to say that they include everything we need.
 - a. "Even though God did not include instrumental music in the Bible, there are secular records of 1st century Christians using instruments."
 - b. "Just because God doesn't say he wants it, it doesn't make it wrong."
 - c. "The New Testament is just a love letter, not a law that we have to keep."
 - 3. However, faith comes by hearing God's word (<u>Rom. 10:17</u>).
 - 4. If we walk by faith, then we must walk only in that which God revealed through His word.
 - 5. Jesus promised that the Holy Spirit would reveal all truth (John 16:13).
 - 6. In order to walk in the Spirit (<u>Gal. 5:25</u>) we must walk in the truth revealed by the Spirit, but if we go beyond the Scriptures then we are no longer walking in the Spirit but in our own wisdom.
- C. Authority of New Testament Scriptures
 - 1. <u>Heb. 1:1-2</u>: God speaks through Jesus Christ.
 - 2. John 14:26; 16:13-15: Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to reveal God's word (<u>1 Cor. 2:10-11</u>).

- 3. The Holy Spirit revealed God's word through the apostles and prophets (<u>Eph. 3:5</u>).
- 4. The apostles and prophets recorded the revelation of the Holy Spirit for the churches so that Christians will always *"have a reminder of these things"* (<u>2 Pet. 1:12; 3:16</u>). See also 1 Thess. 5:27; Col. 4:16.
- 5. Therefore what is written in the New Testament Scriptures is inspire of God and able to make the man of God complete (<u>1 Cor. 14:37</u>; <u>Col. 4:16</u>; <u>2 Thess.</u> <u>2:15</u>; <u>3:24</u>).

II. And Is Profitable

- A. The Scriptures are given for our use
 - 1. <u>2 Pet. 1:19</u>: They are as a light in a dark place.
 - 2. Eph. 4:17-24: They are necessary for overcoming the ignorance in the world.
 - 3. <u>Deut. 10:12-13</u>: God's word is given for our good—but if we add to and do not abide in His word then it is for our judgment (<u>John 12:48</u>; <u>2 John 9</u>; <u>Rev. 22:18-19</u>).
- B. For Doctrine:
 - 1. Doctrine is teaching—The New Testament is the teachings of Christ.
 - 2. <u>Matt. 28:20</u>: Jesus commanded that all of His commands be taught and kept by His disciples.
 - 3. <u>John 8:31-32</u>: In order for His disciples to be free in the truth they must be devoted to His doctrine.
 - 4. The Scriptures are our source for that doctrine—they the teachings of Christ revealed through the Holy Spirit, as Jesus promised "*He will take of what is Mine and declare it to you*" (John 16:14).
- C. For Reproof:
 - 1. Testing, proving, examining.
 - 2. We are commanded to examine our faith (<u>2 Cor. 13:5</u>)—The Scriptures are the standard for that examination.
 - 3. Testing all things (<u>1 Thess. 5:21</u>); testing spirits (<u>1 John 4:1</u>)—The Scriptures are the standard for that testing.
 - 4. <u>Rom. 12:2</u>: Proving what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God.
- D. For Instruction in Righteousness
 - 1. Without the revelation of God, men are completely ignorant of the righteousness of God.
 - 2. But through the Scriptures the righteousness of God is revealed (<u>1 Cor. 15:33-34</u>).
 - 3. <u>Rom. 1:16-17; 3:26</u>: They reveal how God makes us righteous through Jesus Christ.
 - 4. <u>1 John 2:29; 3:7</u>: They reveal how we can be righteous as God is righteous.
 - 5. <u>Matt. 6:33</u>: They reveal the kingdom of God and His righteousness that we may seek it first.

III. That the Man of God May Be Complete

- A. God's word makes us complete, because it is perfect.
 - 1. It gives us doctrine from which we have faith.
 - 2. It gives us weapons against error (2 Cor. 10:4-6).
 - 3. It corrects our error
 - 4. It teaches how to live righteous by God's standard.
- B. It reveals the good works that we are to do.
 - 1. <u>Titus 2:14</u>: God's people have been purchased by the blood of Christ for good works.
 - 2. <u>Heb. 10:24</u>; <u>Titus 3:8, 14</u>: When the church is together Christians are to exhort and instruct one another toward good works.
 - 3. <u>2 Tim. 3:17</u>: God's word is the standard for that instruction.
 - 4. Not only is it the standard, but as Paul said in 2 Tim. 3:17, God's work makes us perfectly equipped for every good work.
 - a. Since the Bible makes us complete, it is complete.
 - b. In other words, THE BIBLE GIVES US EVERYTHING WE NEED TO ACCOMPLISH GOD'S WILL ON EARTH.
 - c. IF GOD DIDN'T PUT SOMETHING IN THE BIBLE, IT MEANS HE DOESN'T WANT IT!

Conclusion

- 1. As God's word, the Scriptures should be near and dear to the heart of every Christian. "I will write My law on their hearts" (Jer. 31:33).
- 2. We see what God says about His word, let us therefore be diligent to learn His word and to uphold it as the only standard for our life (2 Tim. 2:15).
- 3. Let us be content to "speak as the oracles of God" without going beyond God's word for our authority (1 Pet. 4:11).
- 4. In so doing we will have God in all that we do (2 John 9b).
