# Building a Tower, Making War

#### Introduction

- 1. Whenever men make investments, they consider if the gain is worth the sacrifice.
  - a. Is an education worth the expense and sacrifice of schooling?
    - b. Is a car worth the dealer's asking price?
  - c. Is saving another person's life worth putting my life in danger?
- 2. Every commitment requires this kind of evaluation: Are the benefits worth the costs?
- 3. If we are going to follow Christ we must make such an evaluation.
  - a. Every person who desires salvation must ask themselves, are the benefits wroth the sacrifices that I will be making?
  - b. Is eternal life worth committing my life on this earth to serving God?
  - c. In this lesson we will examine four parables in which Jesus teaches us to count the costs of Discipleship.

## Discussion

## I. Luke 14:26-27: The Kind of Commitment Required

- A. God is very clear about the dangers of sin because He wants us to avoid it at all costs.
- B. He is equally clear about the kind of commitment that is required because He wants so badly for us to succeed in following Him.
- C. He shows us exactly the kind of commitment and the kinds of sacrifices we will have to make so that we can be prepared:
  - 1. If our own family will not follow God, we must be willing to choose God over them.
  - 2. <u>2 Tim. 3:12</u>: All who desire to live godly will suffer.
- D. <u>Luke 9:23-26</u>: Only those who are willing to deny themselves and be fully committed to Christ will be able to follow Him.
  - 1. They must understand that even the entire world is not worth giving up the kingdom.
  - 2. <u>Mark 10:29-31</u>: Many different sacrifices will be required.

#### II. Luke 14:28-32: Commitment Requires Sacrifice

- A. <u>Rom. 12:2</u>: Salvation requires change, change requires sacrifice.
  - 1. Change requires that we give up certain things from our past.
  - 2. It also requires that we put on certain things in Christ.
- B. We must determine if unconditional commitment is worth the benefits of salvation.
  - 1. We are not investing a few dollars or a couple days per week.
  - 2. We are investing our entire lives to the service of God.
- C. <u>Matt. 13:44</u>: Jesus teaches us that the kingdom is indeed worth everything we have.
- D. Do you recognize the tremendous value of God's kingdom?

# III. Luke 14:33: The Necessity of Commitment

A. <u>Rom. 6:16, 20</u>: Before salvation we were committed to sin.

- 1. We gave our lives for sin.
- 2. We were bound to it, we served it.
- 3. In many cases, we put ourselves in danger just so we could practice our sins.
- B. <u>Rom. 6:18</u>: In order to have salvation, we must become fully committed to righteousness.
  - 1. Christ is merely teaching us that, instead of giving our lives in service to sin, we are better off giving our lives in service to righteousness.
  - 2. Those who become Christians are freed from their sins, but they, in turn, become servants of righteousness.
  - 3. While sin only results in death, righteousness will result in eternal life to those who are truly committed to it (<u>Rom. 6:23</u>).
- C. In <u>Luke 14:33</u>, Jesus teaches us that without such commitment we cannot be His disciples.

  - a. Family
  - b. Property
  - c. Future
- 2. Rom. 8:18: The hope of eternal life is greater than anything in this life.
