Love the Lord

John 14:21

Introduction

- 1. John 14:21: "He who has My Commandments and keeps them, it is He who loves Me."
- 2. Love for the Lord is one of the most important elements in Christian life.
- 3. Though this is important, it is easy to misunderstand what it means because the world's definition of love is very different than God's.
- 4. So that we may love God the way He wants to be love, He instructs us through the Scriptures.

Discussion

I. Love for the Lord Defined:

- 1. Love for the Lord was just as essential in the O.T. as it is in the N.T.
- 2. Love is a command—contrary to the world's understanding of love.
- 3. It is something that can and must be learned (<u>Titus 2:4</u>).
- 4. <u>Ps. 5:11</u>: The love that is commanded is not emotionalism, but it does result in true and eternal joy.
- B. Love Obeys all of God's commands
 - 1. John 14:15: "If you love me, keep My Commandments." not first time mentioned.
 - 2. <u>Ex. 20:6</u>: God shows mercy to those who love Him and keep His commandments
 - 3. <u>Deut. 11:1</u>: Love, keep charge, statutes, judgments, and commandments.
 - 4. Similar statements made throughout the Scriptures.
 - 5. Why is obedience so closely linked to loving the Lord?
- C. Love Walks in the Ways of the Lord
 - 1. <u>Deut. 11:22</u>: To love the Lord your God to walk in His ways.
 - 2. God is righteousness, therefore the way He conducts Himself is in righteousness.
 - 3. His ways are His manner of conduct, the standard by which He walks.
 - 4. Those who love the Lord do so because of who and what He is, and they seek to be like Him in Character—to make His ways their ways.
 - 5. This is what Jesus taught us in the Sermon on the Mount, saying, "*Therefore you shall be perfect, just as your Father in heaven is perfect*" (<u>Matt. 5:48</u>).
 - 6. How do we learn to walk in the ways of God?
- D. Love Writes God's Law In Our Hearts: <u>Deut. 6:5-9; Heb. 8:10</u>:
 - 1. <u>Rom. 6:17</u>: The word of God is in our hearts when we obey the gospel.
 - 2. <u>Rom. 12:2</u>: From that point on, as the knowledge of God's word grows in our hearts, we are transformed by it, proving in our bodies the perfect will of God.
 - 3. When this is the case, then our hearts desire will be for the word of God—to learn it, to do it, and to make it a part of who we are.
 - 4. <u>Matt. 4:4</u>: It will be our sustenance; true fulfillment in this life.
 - 5. <u>Ps. 119:6-20, 33-37</u>: Our delight will be in the law of the Lord.
- E. Love for God draws us to His word to keep His commands. When this is the case...
 - 1. We will hate evil: <u>Ps. 97:10</u>; <u>Amos 5:15</u>

- a. To love God is to be devoted to His ways.
- b. Evil is anything that is contrary to God and His ways.
- c. We know we love God when we abhor anything that is contrary to God.
- d. When we strive to justify things that God does not love, then the love of God is not in us.
- 2. We will glorify God with our very being:
 - a. <u>Ps. 40:16</u>: We will say with our lips, "The Lord be magnified!"
 - b. <u>1 Cor. 6:20</u>: But more than that, we will glorify the Lord with our bodies.
 - c. <u>Matt. 5:16</u>: Thus our lights will shine on earth to the glory of God

II. Circumcision Of The Heart: Loving The Lord With Our All

- A. <u>Deut. 10:14-17</u>: Those who had true love for the Lord had circumcised hearts.
- B. <u>Gen. 17:11-13</u>: Circumcision of the flesh in the O.T. was sign of Israel's covenant relationship with God.
 - 1. The purpose for the covenant was to have special relationship with God—to be His special people, completely devoted to Him.
 - 2. Transversely, the richness of God's blessings would be upon those who have a covenant relationship with them.
 - 3. Circumcision of the flesh was merely the outward sign of that covenant; it was a continual reminder of the Israelite's relationship with God.
- C. <u>Rom. 2:29</u>: Those who love the Lord and belong to Him are circumcised in their hearts.
 - 1. As in the Old Testament, we have a continual reminder that we belong to God, but it is not a fleshly mark.
 - 2. The sign of our covenant—the continual reminder of our relationship with God—is our love for God!
 - 3. Our circumcision is a heart that is completely devoted to God!
 - a. A heart that is sanctified for His service—obey from the heart (Rom. 6:17).
 - b. Belonging to Him and no other—only serve one master (Luke 16:13).
 - c. Our love for Him takes preeminence above all else—(Matt 10:37-39).
- D. Such a relationship begins when we obey the gospel (Gal. 3:26-27; 4:6).

III. The Benefits of Loving the Lord

- A. John 14:21-23: "We will make our home with him."
 - 1. Jesus promised that He would manifest Himself to us.
 - 2. In further explanation He said that He and the Father would make their home with us.
 - 3. What did He mean by this?
- B. The life which Christ lived is manifest in us:
 - 1. The law of God is the description of His character for man to follow.
 - 2. In the New Testament we have the "mind of Christ" (1 Cor. 2:16).
 - 3. When we write His law on our hearts we are making the character of God's heart the character of our heart.
 - 4. When we walk in all the ways of the Lord, then the character of God not only fills or hearts, but our actions as well.
 - 5. <u>Gal. 2:20</u>: Thus, like Paul, we will be able to say that the Lord lives in us.

- C. Such a relationship is the ultimate purpose in this life.
 - 1. <u>Ps. 5:11</u>: "Let those who love Your name be joyful in You."
 - 2. We were created to have this relationship with God!
 - 3. Therefore, it makes sense that this is the only way we are able to find true joy.
 - 4. <u>Ps. 18:1-3</u>: When we love the Lord then we gain strength through Him.
 - 5. Why? Because this is the way it was meant to be!

Conclusion

- 1. Do you love the Lord?
- 2. We know whether or not we love the Lord, for Jesus said, "He who does not love Me does not keep My words" (John 14:23).
- 3. Loving the Lord involves so much more that just saying the words. It means showing that love in every aspect of our lives.
- 4. The blood of Christ is able to cleanse and sanctify those who love Him because they, in turn have given themselves to Him.
 - a. Have you given yourself to the Lord?
 - b. Do you gladly give yourselves to His service?
 - c. Are you actively and urgently fleeing the sin that separates you from God?
 - d. Are you seeking ways to bear fruit unto God so that Jesus Christ can be seen in you?
- 5. Do not sell yourself short. Draw near to God, love Him with your entire being, and you will find true and eternal joy through Him.
