Mercy, Forgiveness

Unforgiving Servant, Creditor and Debtors, Barren Fig Tree

Introduction

- 1. Jesus died on the cross in order to make salvation available to all men.
- 2. Because He shed his blood we can have the forgiveness of our sins.
- 3. However, in the gospel we are taught not only how to have the forgiveness of our sins, but that we must, in turn, forgive others as well.
- 4. To help us understand this, Jesus gives three parables.

Discussion

- I. The Unforgiving Servant: Matt. 18:21-35.
 - A. The greater debt: Matt. 18:22-27
 - 1. The debt that any one man owes God because of sin is great indeed.
 - 2. 10,000 talents ~ \$50 mil.
 - 3. Such is the severity of our sins.
 - B. The lesser debt: Matt. 18:28-30
 - 1. This debt represents one man's sins toward another.
 - 2. \$20 compared to \$50 mil.
 - 3. Relative to our sins against God, our brother's sins against us are few indeed.
 - C. Forgive as you have been forgiven: Matt. 18:31-35
 - 1. When the master heard of his lack of compassion he became angry.
 - 2. "Should you not also have had compassion on your fellow servant" (vs. 33).
 - 3. If we want God to be forgiving of us, we must learn to be like Him and learn to forgive others.
 - 4. "Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors" (Matt. 6:12, 14).

II. Creditor and Debtors: Luke 7:41-48

- A. Two Debtors: Luke 7:41-42
 - 1. Two men, owe different amounts.
 - 2. The more we owe, the more we need to be forgiven.
 - 3. Jesus is here contrasting the Pharisee with the sinner.
 - 4. The sinner had the greater debt (in her mind).
- B. The Greater Appreciation: 7:43-47
 - 1. Because the woman was more aware of her debt, she showed greater appreciation than the Pharisee.
 - 2. The Pharisee was self-righteous, therefore, in his mind, he had the lesser debt.
 - How we show appreciation is determined by our understanding how great our debt its.

- C. Putting self in perspective
 - 1. People who do not realize the severity of their sins do not appreciate what Christ is offering.
 - 2. Those who have the humility to acknowledge the severity of their sins will love God more because of His great compassion.

III. The Barren Fig Tree: Luke 13:6-9

- A. The barren tree: Vs. 6-7
 - 1. The tree is in the field, but had not fruit.
 - 2. There are some in the kingdom which do not bear any fruit.
 - 3. Like the tree, they are in danger of being torn out and burned.
- B. Waiting for change: Vs. 8
 - 1. Through Christ, we are given the gift of patience.
 - 2. We have but a few moments to turn to God and start bearing fruit.
 - 3. 2 Pet. 3:9: God is longsuffering toward us.
- C. Limited Patience: Vs. 9
 - 1. God's patience will not last forever.
 - 2. 2 Pet. 3:10: The day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night.
 - 3. We only have a limited amount time to start bearing fruit.
 - 4. Let us take advantage of the time that we have.

Conclusion

- 1. Without forgiveness we cannot have salvation.
- 2. In order to forgiven, we must learn how to be forgiving.

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
